On August 1, 2017 from 6:00pm to 9:00pm, the Fircrest Police Department and the City of Fircrest will be joining over 16,100 other communities from all 50 states, US territories, Canadian cities and military bases worldwide in promoting "National Night Out Against Crime." In all, over

38.5 million people participated in National Night Out in 2016 and this year's event is expected to be larger still.

National Night Out is an opportunity to build neighborhood unity and strengthen the police community partnership that is so important to the success of our community policing efforts. Last year, our event included law enforcement agencies, fire departments, other emergency responders, civic groups, military, business groups, neighborhood organizations and public officials.

We are delighted that over the past eighteen years our National Night Out event has been judged and recognized nationally as one of the best events in the nation and we are very pleased that we received a special award from Safe Streets for our commitment to positive resident involvement.

2018 Budget Starting Soon

Even though we are only halfway through 2017, the City is starting the 2018 budget process. Staff will begin compiling data and crunching

numbers in June. The preliminary budget will be presented to Council on September 12th. Budget study sessions will be held Monday, September 25th and every Monday in October with public hearings set for October 10th and October 24th.
