

Mayor's Message



I'm guessing that many of you have sat under the roof of the Ron Russo Pavilion in Fircrest Park at some point. I've been there for my kids' soccer and baseball photos and banquets, I bid on auction items during National Night Out, and I've occasionally dashed under there for relief

from our Northwest rain.

The pavilion is one of those spaces that contributes to our sense of community because it provides a pleasant place to gather with friends.

It was also showing its age. The pavilion was built in the early 1990s, and the roof was in dire need of replacement.

That's when Fircrest-based Acme Roofing stepped in. Cofounders Spencer Ross and Steve Keller offered to replace the pavilion's roof. For free.

For a few days in August, Acme donated time and labor to put a new roof on our beloved pavilion. They even got the materials donated by Pabco Roofing Products, a company based in the Tideflats. For Spencer, it was personal.

"I grew up in Fircrest, on Alta Vista," he told me. "I had a wonderful childhood here. As I drive around Fircrest looking at the roofs I've done, I remember who used to live in those houses when I was a kid. I had a paper route, and the box was

right there on the corner by the pavilion. I would never have thought as a kid that I'd have the opportunity to give back to the community where I grew up."

In fact, the pavilion roof marked the third time this year that Spencer volunteered Acme's services to the city. In May, city staff members were perplexed as to how we were going to patch a large tear in the deteriorating liner at the shallow end of the pool. If we couldn't patch it, we couldn't open the aging pool for one last summer.

Our friends at Acme came over and used their roofing expertise to patch the liner. Then we drained the rainwater out of the deep end and discovered another major tear. Again, Spencer came to the rescue. After we repaired a faulty pump (the pool really was on its last legs), we were able to open the pool for a shortened season before tearing it down to start building a new pool.

I never take volunteerism for granted. One of the hallmarks of a great community is knowing there are people who will support it with their time and talent. On behalf of the City Council and the residents we serve, thank you Spencer Ross and Acme Roofing!

Construction Begins on New Pool



Our new pool and community center are off to a great start. We broke ground on Aug. 19 for the pool portion of the project and construction has begun, with the goal of opening the new pool sometime next summer.

In April 2019, Fircrest voters overwhelmingly approved a parks bond to build the new Fircrest Community Center and Pool. Years of planning and input from Fircrest citizens led to this point.

The new Community Center and Pool will feature:

- Larger, 15,000- sq. ft. community center with spaces for weddings, business rentals and other events; community kitchen, teen room and other gathering places. The center will also serve as a community emergency shelter.
- High-school sized multi-purpose gym for sports and fitness programs
- 25-yard pool with six lap lanes, a diving board and a whirlpool play area
- Kiddie pool
- New pool house including locker rooms, party room and community kitchen
- Outdoor plaza and pedestrian pathway better connecting the pool, community center and adjacent park

We've launched a website <u>www.fircrestcommunitycenter.org</u> to keep you up-to date on the entire project. We're pleased to announce two generous donations from the Bill and Joyce Edwards Foundation (\$1 million) and the Names Family Foundation (\$3 million) that will help us reach our fundraising goal for this project. Our fundraising goal is \$8.5 million; with these and other grants we've received, we have \$2.0 million left to raise.
