Climate Resilience: A Community Approach

As our city and our region experience growth and change, climate resilience has become an increasingly important and timely consideration. Regional weather patterns are undergoing deviations from historical norms, leading to more frequent and consequential drought and an escalation in the amount of unseasonably hot and cold days.

The Western North America heat wave of 2021 was the deadliest and most economically disruptive weather-related event in Washington State history. According to Department of Health data, at least 112 casualties were recorded, including 21 in Pierce County. Severe temperature extremes described as "once in a millennium" melted infrastructure and savaged crops, resulting in at least \$9.4 billion in direct economic losses in the Pacific Northwest region of Oregon and Washington per the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. Weather events are especially hazardous to the health of the elderly, infants and small children, and those with certain health conditions. Poor and marginalized persons are often affected to a disproportionate degree. Notably, the Seattle metro area has the lowest availability of home air conditioning on a per capita basis of all major US cities.

Here is what Fircrest is doing to encourage climate resilience and respond and adapt to weather extremes.

Effective climate resilience demands a multipronged strategy, composed of natural mitigations and anthropogenic (human-

created) interventions. First, natural resources are leveraged to make the most of what the environment has to offer. In Fircrest, trees—and especially old-growth trees—are producing clean oxygen, sequestering carbon dioxide, providing shade and shelter, and furnishing habitat and sustenance for keystone species such as honeybees. The Fircrest Municipal Code includes a tree policy with the purpose of protecting existing trees and requiring the planting of new trees.

In concert with the natural environment, technology and infrastructure enhance climate resilience. The City opted to include solar energy panels in the recent construction of the pool and community center complex, as well as building the center to LEED Silver certification standards. LEED-credentialed buildings are recognized for improved energy efficiency, reduced carbon emissions, and sustainability.

Further green policies under consideration include installation of electric vehicle charging stations and future electrification of the City fleet.

A final aspect of the City's approach is preparedness. Measures include emergency management readiness: City Council members attend FEMA training including education on natural disaster and weather emergency response. Additionally, the City periodically reviews and updates its cybersecurity plan to ensure continuity of operations in the event of a system disruption.

Public Works—Back to School Safety!

With the start of a new school year underway, Fircrest Public Works wants to remind motorists the importance of safety around school buses and school zones. There are two schools in the City located on Alameda Ave that many Fircrest locals attend.

The transition from summer schedules to morning and afternoon drop-offs and pickups puts motorists and pedestrians at increased risk. Anytime is a good time to improve your traffic safety practices. Here are some helpful tips to create a safer environment around schools and buses.


Tips for motorists:

- SLOW DOWN! Red means stop whether you're at an intersection or near a bus stop.
- Do not drive distracted.
- Be aware of your surroundings. Take note of areas with reduced or limited visibility.
- Keep your distance from buses. The area 15 feet around a school bus is where children are in the most danger.

Tips to share with children:

- Learn and practice the safety rules for walking and bicycling.
- Always use caution when stepping into the roadway. Just because pedestrians have the right-of-way, doesn't mean that motorists are aware of your presence.
- Follow all school bus driver instructions while entering or exiting a bus.

Planning & Building

Is the Solicitor at your Door Licensed?

Any individual who sells goods or services door-to-door or from a temporary location in Fircrest is required to have a city-issued Solicitors/ Merchant License in addition to a Fircrest business license endorsement. Before issuance, the applicant must be approved by staff and the Police Chief.

Solicitors may sell goods such as tree work, driveway sealing, highspeed internet and cable service, free estimates for home improvements, or home security alarm systems.

Soliciting is regulated by Chapter 5.08 of the Fircrest Municipal Code. Soliciting without a license is a criminal offense and violators of Chapter 5.08 may be charged with a misdemeanor.

Solicitors who receive a license are instructed to have the license on them at all times while going door-to-door. Residents who want to report a person or company soliciting without a permit, or who view suspicious activities should call 911 for a response from the Police Department. Who is exempt?

Solicitors who offer only the following goods or services do not need a license to solicit in Fircrest: bona fide candidates and campaign workers, newspaper vendors, and nonprofit organizations.

What rules must solicitors follow in Fircrest?

Solicitors must have a city-issued license, and they must show it to you if you ask to see it. A solicitor is not allowed to knock or ring the bell where a "No Soliciting" sign is posted. Solicitors may knock on your door only between the hours of 9:00 am and 7:00 pm. A solicitor must leave your property when asked to do so.

What should residents do when a solicitor knocks on their door?

You aren't required to open your door. If you do, ask to see their Fircrest Merchant License. Never let a solicitor into your home. Remember, solicitors, are strangers. Use the same caution that you would use with any other stranger at your door.
