# **Honorable Mayor and City Councilmembers**

Below is the weekly overview of upcoming events, meetings, and other items of interest for the City. The update includes reports from City departments on various programs, projects, and achievements.

# 1. Planning Commission Opening

The City is seeking interested residents for appointment to the <u>Planning Commission</u>. This 6-year voluntary position is an opportunity for citizens to play a pivotal role in the development and future vision of Fircrest. Eligible applicants must be residents of Fircrest and registered voters. Letters of interest, along with a resume (optional), are due to the City Clerk no later than 5:00 PM on Thursday, May 23, 2024. Appointments are made by the Mayor and confirmed by the City Council. ## 2. Seasonal Maintenance Worker Job Opportunities

The Fircrest Public Works Department is currently seeking individuals to join our team as Seasonal Maintenance Workers. Seasonal workers will perform skilled manual labor utilizing a variety of hand and power tools to maintain and repair City parks, roads, grounds, and facilities. We are looking for hard-working individuals with a positive and friendly attitude who enjoy working outdoors and can engage with the public in a courteous and professional manner. We are seeking team players who can work effectively alongside co-workers as well as working independently with intermittent supervision. If you are a motivated individual with a passion for community service, we encourage you to apply and join us in making a positive impact in the City of Fircrest.

The Seasonal Worker positions are temporary and typically work 40 hours per week, Monday through Friday, from 7:00 AM to 3:30 PM. Positions start between late spring and early summer. Applicants must be 18 years of age and possess a valid Washington State Driver's License with an acceptable driving record. # 3. Summer Day Camp Registration

Registration for Kids Summer Camp opens on Monday, May 13th. This year, we are offering six weeks of day camp for kids ages 7-12. Sessions begin on July 8<sup>th</sup>, with a weekly price of \$165 for residents and \$195 for non-residents. # 4. Transient Merchants Registration

As the weather is slowly improving, the City has begun experiencing an uptick in transient merchant activities. A transient merchant is a person or business that conducts temporary business in the City. Transient merchants are also called canvassers, peddlers, or street sellers, who most commonly sell goods or services on a temporary basis. They may go door-to-door or operate out of a pop-up booth but are certainly not limited to these venues.

All transient merchants doing business in Fircrest are required to obtain a City business license and apply for a transient merchant registration. Certain business activities are exempt, including newspaper vendors, nonprofit organizations, political candidates, campaign workers for ballot issues, persons soliciting signatures of registered voters on petitions, and vendors at city-sponsored events. A list of approved transient merchants is on the City website at Active Transient Merchant List. Remember, if someone comes to your door soliciting business or selling items, you have the right to ask to see their approved registration. Additional information about the City's requirements for transient merchants is in the Fircrest Municipal Code, Chapter 5.08 - Transient Merchant Registration.

### 6. Administration Update

Administration highlights include:

- The City Records Management Project kicked off on May 9<sup>th</sup>. A Washington State Archives consultant trained City department representatives on record management best practices, retention schedules, and proper destruction procedures. As part of this project, employees can request further training that best fits their respective departments' needs.
- The Fircrest Civil Service Commission met on May 6<sup>th</sup>. The Commission reelected Commissioner Alex Koerger as Chair and Commissioner John Bechtholt as Chair Pro Tem for one-year terms. They were formally presented with proposed amendments to the Civil Service Rules and voted to reschedule their June meeting to June 17<sup>th</sup> due to scheduling conflicts. The Civil Service Commission meets at Fircrest City Hall on the first Monday of every month at 4:00 PM. Public participation is encouraged. Learn more at the Civil Service Commission webpage.
- Civil Service Lateral Police Officer oral boards are scheduled for May 14<sup>th</sup>. There is currently one out-of-state candidate slated to be interviewed. Interested Lateral Police Officer candidates can apply at Employment Opportunities City of Fircrest.
- City Manager Dawn Masko and Public Works Director Tyler Bemis conducted a second interview with a PW Office Coordinator candidate this past week. We are pleased to announce that Sherry Canavan has accepted the position. Her tentative start date is May 22nd. Sherry is a former Fircrest employee, and we are incredibly excited for her to hit the ground running with her institutional knowledge and passion for the City of Fircrest.

- The Centennial Celebration Historical Subcommittee met this past week with former Councilmember Blake Surina and Civil Service Commissioner John Bechtholt regarding volunteering, sponsorships, historical artifacts, and event ideas.
- City Manager Masko is preparing materials for the upcoming Finance Director recruitment.
- City Manager Masko is working on a market compensation study for non-represented positions.
- The City received five public records requests this week for a total of 111 requests in 2024.
- In the last 30 days, the City's website has had 20,170 page views from 6,337 users. Sessions are down 7%, and users are down 12% from the previous 30 days.
- Acting Clerk Arlette Burkhart will be attending the WA Association of Public Records Officers (WAPRO) virtual spring conference from May 15<sup>th</sup> to May 16<sup>th</sup>.

# 7. Finance Department Update

- Finance staff continue to work on the Annual Report, which is due to the State by May 29<sup>th</sup>.
- The City received the final payment of \$16,587 for the water meter grant.
- Gas cards were received for all City-owned vehicles, and the gas card policy was updated.
- The electronic timesheet program implementation is continuing to progress. A test file will be done soon, followed by department head training.
- Retail sales tax spreadsheets are being updated. The City's IT consultant, Locke Systems, was able to restore a missing file containing several years of retail sales tax information.
- The Equipment Rental & Replacement (ERR) maintenance spreadsheets are also being updated to incorporate the last 2-3 years of information.
- The month-end reports for March and April are on hold until the State reports are filed.

### 8. Information Technology Update

• Thank you to everyone for your patience these past two days while the City was undergoing network upgrades and maintenance. There are still some outstanding items to address, but generally speaking, most systems are back up and functioning.

This project was largely about building a better IT foundation for the City moving forward, but there are also some immediate benefits. Internet bandwidth has quadrupled at City Hall, Public Works, and the Community Center compared to last year. Internet bandwidth at the Public Safety Building is ten times greater than it was on May 8<sup>th</sup>! New Wi-Fi networks are simplified and more secure, with the new guest Wi-Fi now allowing for roaming between City buildings without having to reenter passwords. Our virtual networks have also been streamlined for better management. Thank you to IT Coordinator Chris Bunger and IT consultants Locke Systems for their hard work and effort these last few days to upgrade our infrastructure and enhance our operational capabilities.

# 9. Police Department Update

- Sergeant Gollinger attended the FBI-LEEDA Supervisory Leadership Institute Training this week in Lake Stevens.
- Chief Ron Schaub attended the Pierce County Law Enforcement Memorial on Thursday night to honor law enforcement officers killed in the line of duty and those who continue to serve.

- Officer Lease arrested a person attempting to steal a car.
- Community Service Officer Selena Byrd attended regional records training in Tukwila this week.
- Officer Garcia assisted Wainwright Intermediate School with traffic control this week for a field trip to TAPCO Credit Union and Tacoma Community College.
- On April 29<sup>th</sup>, the Pierce County Police Chief's Association submitted a letter to the three radio system owners supporting a single radio system and requesting that agencies that can switch between systems be allowed to do so. Pierce County Executive Bruce Dammeier responded to the letter, stating that Pierce County, Puyallup, and Tacoma are continuing to review options for implementation of a single countywide radio system and "are working to develop concepts that include interim, phased, and long-term models for ownership. Any concepts developed will be shared with stakeholders and customers for feedback."
- Fircrest officers responded to 166 calls for service from 4/28/2024 to 5/5/2024, including 121 traffic stops, which generated 68 notices of infraction. The chart below provides additional information.

# 10. Planning & Building Update

- The Planning & Building Department is currently short-staffed as it searches for a new Permit Coordinator/Assistant Planner/Code Enforcement Officer. Interviews are tentatively scheduled for May 16<sup>th</sup>. We appreciate your patience during this transition.
- We continue to be busy issuing over-the-counter (OTC) building, mechanical, plumbing, and reroofing permits. Applicants are receiving same-day or one-business-day turnaround time for OTC permits.
- CD Director Newman is working with the Department of Commerce on a contract amendment in order to receive our Year 2 grant reimbursement for the Comprehensive Plan Update grant.

- CD Director Newman continues to work with a permit applicant to review planning and stormwater comments related to a new single-family residential home and ADU on the 1200 block of Arondale Drive.
- Thank you to everyone who took the time to submit comments on the 2024 Comprehensive Plan. The City received 26 online submissions. The feedback, data, and responses to questions will be provided as an update tentatively scheduled for the June 25<sup>th</sup> City Council meeting and will be posted on the City website.
- The City received one new code enforcement request this week:
  - o A request to investigate a potential sign code violation along the 200 block of Regents Boulevard. Staff reviewed the request and confirmed there was no violation of the sign code.
- The City continues to monitor existing complaints and requests:
  - Concern over multiple inoperable vehicles, garbage accumulation, and burning of trash along the 200 block of Regents Blvd. Staff sent out a notice of violation letter, but due to short staffing, we have not been able to follow up on this request yet.
  - Oconcern over the accumulation of trash, food waste, and overgrown vegetation along the 200 block of Alameda Avenue. This is in addition to an existing concern regarding an RV being lived in within a single-family zoning district. The City has not yet received a response from the property owner. Due to short-staffing, we have been unable to follow up on this request.
  - Occurrence over a residential property along the 200 block of Contra Costa Avenue that is accumulating trash and does not have an active Westside Disposal account. City staff sent a notice of violation to the property owner to activate a solid waste disposal account and keep the property clean. CD Director Newman has also requested a list from Public Works of all properties in the City that do not currently have active accounts with Westside Disposal and will send them a letter stating that it is a code requirement to have trash service.
  - There is concern over an unpermitted structure built in the backyard of a residential property along the 1200 block of Palm Drive. City staff reviewed the structure and confirmed that a building permit is indeed required. They have reached out to the property owner to begin the permitting process.
- The Fircrest Planning Commission met for its regularly scheduled meeting on Tuesday, May 7<sup>th</sup>. There was robust public attendance and comment, with citizens most concerned about the new middle housing laws and how they will affect the City's character as a small, walkable community. CD Director Newman and the Planning Commission addressed the public's concerns by explaining the laws and design controls available to the City to maintain its cherished character. They also invited the public to the June 17<sup>th</sup> Study Session, where the City's consultant, Kimley-Horn, will give a presentation on the Middle Housing work plan. CD Director Newman is also working on creating a new webpage specifically for Middle Housing to keep the community informed and updated.
- CD Director Newman assisted the Finance Department with reviewing a refund request related to permit fees.
- On April 30, 2024, the Department of Commerce released a draft of the 2024-2029 State Homeless Housing Strategic Plan. The draft is available on Box at <u>Plan Update Materials</u> or <u>Draft Plan (PDF)</u>. Commerce is inviting interested parties to provide public comment. Comments can be submitted by attending an online listening session, filling out an <u>online web form</u>, or by <u>email</u>. Per <u>Chapter 42.56 RCW</u>, all comments submitted are public records and may be subject to public disclosure. More information can be found on the <u>Commerce website</u>.

• Whittier Park Master Plan – The Whittier Park Master Plan webpage has been updated with the revised site concepts, survey, and comment form link. Fircrest citizens are invited to review the two preferred plans presented on April 25<sup>th</sup> and leave comments by clicking the link. The comment period will conclude on May 17<sup>th</sup>. AHBL will then tabulate all comments for review and utilization as they develop the final plan. The final draft of the Whittier Park Master Plan will be presented to the Fircrest City Council at an upcoming regular City Council meeting or a City Council study session.

# 12. Public Works Update

Public Works' current winter operating winter hours are 8:00 AM to 4:30 PM.

Highlights include: (in addition to routine daily tasks)

#### Administration

We appreciate your continued patience as Public Works is operating short-staffed. The PW Office Coordinator position is vacant, and a Facilities Maintenance Worker and two Utility Workers are currently off work.

### Utilities - Water, Sewer, Streets, and Stormwater

- Summer hire applications are being reviewed, with plans to hire 2 4 Utilities summer hires. The job posting will remain open until all positions are filled.
- The contractor is tentatively scheduled to pull the pump at Wellhouse #9 the week of May 13<sup>th</sup> to inspect and repair or replace it as needed.
- The replacement pump for The Commons Lift Station is expected to arrive by the end of June.
- The fire hydrant at El Dorado and Regents Blvd. was repaired on April 16<sup>th</sup>. The final asphalt patching and concrete curb repair will occur soon.

 The "Sidewalk closed" barricades near the Claremont rock wall failure site have been removed following the removal of the wall's height. The property owner is currently performing the repairs and continues to keep Public Works informed.

### Maintenance – Parks & Facilities

- Citywide irrigation repairs are being completed, and startup is 90% complete in preparation for this weekend's warm weather forecast.
- A broken toilet was replaced in one of the exterior public bathrooms at the Pool House.
- Summer hire applications are being reviewed with plans to hire one summer hire for Facilities/Parks.

  - o The contractor is procuring equipment and materials in preparation to start construction, with Public Works staff continuing to review material submittals.
  - o Tree removal is being coordinated to begin the site prep process.
- Stormwater Pre-Treatment Outfall Grant Project Emerson Street & Estate Place
  - o Final close-out Progress Reports and Payment Requests are in progress.
- Emerson Street Sidewalk Extension (south side) Woodside Drive to 67<sup>th</sup> Ave West
  - o Engineering design is in process.
- Regents Blvd (west) Grind & Overlay Alameda Ave to 67<sup>th</sup> Ave West
  - We are working with WSDOT to prepare a Notice to Proceed.
- AMI Water Meter Exchange Program
  - o Meter exchanges are in progress, with program completion currently at 56%.

# 14. Professional Municipal Clerks Week

This week, May 5<sup>th</sup> -11<sup>th</sup>, is Annual Professional Municipal Clerks Week – a time to recognize and appreciate the invaluable contributions of municipal clerks to our communities. Municipal clerks provide an essential service, serving as custodians of official public records and typically being the initial point of contact for citizens seeking assistance and information. Beyond meticulously recording meeting minutes, they uphold the transparency and integrity of governmental processes. They act as conduits between local governing bodies and the public, ensuring the smooth flow of information. I want to take this opportunity to express my gratitude to Arlette Burkhart, our Acting City Clerk, for her unwavering commitment to the City of Fircrest and for her assistance in helping our city run efficiently and effectively. ### 15. Stamp Out Hunger Food Drive

## 16. Summer Planning Academy

The Puget Sound Regional Council is accepting applications for its Summer Planning Academy (SPA), which will be held in August 2024. SPA is a free leadership development opportunity for students interested in learning about city planning. SPA can also help young people map out the required steps toward a career in the planning field. Upon successful completion of the academy, students are eligible to receive a \$500 scholarship. Local high school students must live in King, Kitsap, Pierce, or Snohomish County and be able to attend in-person sessions in Seattle. Applications are due on May 15<sup>th</sup>. # 17. Habitat Stewardship Training

The Pierce Conservation District is holding its first Habitat Stewardship training in 3 years. The Habitat Stewardship Program works with volunteers to maintain open space sites in Fircrest and Puyallup. As a Habitat Steward, you can take ownership of a site, develop an annual work plan and goals, and lead monthly volunteer work parties. This three-part training series, with two online portions and one field training, will be held on May 15<sup>th</sup> and 22<sup>nd</sup> online from 5:30 – 7:00 PM and on May 18th with field training from 9:00 AM—12:00 PM. # 20. Reduced Pet Adoption Fees
